PARENT/TEACHER STUDENT CONFERENCES

We are quickly approaching our parent-teacher conferences October 27-28, and the meeting times will be coming out soon. This year, as in the past, we will schedule times for grade K-6 parent(s) to visit with your child's homeroom teacher. As last year, the 7th and 8th grade teachers will not be scheduling an exact meeting time. Instead, the teachers will be available in their homerooms for parents to visit as needed. In this way, instead of seeing the homeroom teacher only, a parent may choose to conference with a teacher(s) who teaches a specific subject area to address academic or behavior concerns pertaining to the student.

I always ask that parents understand that conferences can be a positive experience and concerns, helpful strategies, and encouragement can be exchanged; however, time is limited because of the large number of parents with whom teachers will meet. If there is a topic that you feel will need more time than ten minutes or so, please contact the teacher before or after these conference days, so that you will have appropriate time for lengthier discussion.

Attached to this week's newsletter is a form requesting the time you prefer for teacher conferences. Conferences will be held Thursday, October 27, 3:50-8:00 pm and Friday, October 28, 9:30-12:30pm. Dear Parents and Students,

Hope! What a great focus we have for this month of October as we try to grow in the virtue of Hope! INDIANA BICENTENNIAL TORCH RELAY

Indiana is celebrating its 200th birthday with various events around the state. One of the most exciting parts of the celebration happening in each of Indiana's 92 counties is the [Indiana Bicentennial Torch Relay](#). The torch relay kicked off in Corydon, the state's first capital, and will end at the Statehouse on Oct. 15. The torch is being carried by walkers, runners and bearers using various modes of transportation showcasing Indiana's heritage — like race cars and farm equipment. The fourth grade students have been learning about the various counties as they "follow" the torch. They have a large map displayed outside of room 13 to show the daily progress and the students have been sharing snippets of history on our daily P.A. announcements.

The relay will enter Allen County at 10:00 a.m. tomorrow, Saturday, October 1 at 10:00 am. For more information about the route click [HERE](#). NEWS NOTES FROM YOUR SCHOOL NURSE

We are all so busy in our daily school and work routines. Here are a few areas we can all adjust a bit:

DAILY BREAKFAST- Please everyone, let's get the kids up 15 minutes earlier to allow them time to eat a good nutritious breakfast every day. Please make sure they do. BREAKFAST wakes up the body and the brain for all the effort students need to put into learning and doing all day long. Let them help plan it out the night before so it is easier when everyone is half asleep trying to get out the door in the morning. If you have a donut day—give them an apple or a banana too. Too many students are skipping this 'game changer' meal! It is essential for the proper education of our bright scholars.

COUGH DROPS/HYDRATION- A student who is present with a cough or cold can benefit greatly by drinking extra water. It cuts down on coughing, headaches, and aids in bodily functions. Send a water bottle when they have a cold or cough and encourage them to drink and fill it up throughout the day. Cough drops make a student have to leave the learning environment to come up to the office. Cough drops will be dispensed with a parent's written permission note. Please remember, no cough drops in student pockets. Hydration is a good thing!

BODILY FUNCTIONS- 88% or more of the students coming to the clinic every year have painful 'tummy aches.' They don't realize they need to sit a few minutes to achieve a bowel movement. When they do they are always truly amazed at how good they feel again.

Please ask your children if they go, when they go, and if they have been having a 'hard time'. Help them to achieve a daily bowel routine to feel better all day long.

FLU SHOTS (from CDC --Look up: CDC flu for all kinds of Flu Season information)

"A few things are new this season:

- Injectable flu shots are recommended this year. (Flu Mist proved not to be as effective against influenza)

- Flu vaccines have been updated to better match circulating viruses.
 - Recommendations for vaccination of people with egg allergies have changed.
 - 6 months of age and older and those with chronic diseases should get a flu vaccine every year by the end of October (although vaccinations can continue through January or later)
 - check with your health care provider concerning you and your family.
- As always: avoid sick people and wash your hands frequently and keep students at home if ill with the flu”.

PARENT-TEACHER-STUDENT CONFERENCES

Dear Parents,

The purpose of the conference is for parent, student and teacher to discuss together the progress the child is making. Report cards will be distributed Friday, October 14. This will give you an opportunity to study the report card and allow you to be better able to discuss the progress being made. **ALL STUDENTS ARE REQUIRED TO ACCOMPANY THEIR PARENTS TO THE CONFERENCE.** Since this is an important time for your child, only you and the child involved should meet the teacher. Other children should sit on the chairs provided in the hallway.

This conference will also allow you to share with the teacher any problems your child may have, whether they be health or other, which would help the teacher to better know the child he/she is working with.

Parents are requested to attend the conference at the time indicated. Conferences will be held **Thursday, October 27, from 3:50-8:00 and Friday, October 28, 9:30-12:30.** Each conference is scheduled to last **no longer than 10 minutes.** If more time is needed, it will be necessary to make another appointment. Those who have two or more children in school will have their schedule arranged so that they will be able to proceed from one classroom to another with as little delay as possible. This arrangement can be made only if the form is returned promptly. Please check the appropriate time preference on the form below. **Your cooperation is requested in returning this form promptly.**
