PARENTS - SOLAR ECLIPSE ALERT!! We will be taking students out to view the Solar Eclipse on Monday. All students will be given their own pair of safety viewing glasses Monday morning and their teachers will practice proper use at that time. Around 2:15 p.m. all students will move outdoors to view the Eclipse in a controlled, supervised setting, while wearing safety glasses for 2-3 short intervals. We will then return indoors. We have more detailed information about the Eclipse from NASA contained in this newsletter.

Dear Parents and Students,

Thank you for your attendance at the HASA meeting last night. As a staff, we always look forward to meeting the parents of our students. Finally, I have included information about the upcoming Solar Eclipse on Monday, August 21st. This event will take place during school hours, and we are planning on allowing the students to view aspects of the Eclipse. Of course, safety is essential. As I mentioned during the HASA meeting, we purchased safety glasses for all students, faculty, and staff to ensure visual safety. We had discussed dismissing early on that day, but felt the event would best be served safely in the school setting. [How to View the 2017 Solar Eclipse Safely](#)



Looking directly at the sun is unsafe except during the brief total phase of a solar eclipse ("totality"), when the moon entirely blocks the sun's bright face, which will happen only within the narrow path of totality (<https://go.nasa.gov/2pC0lhe>(link is external)).



The only safe way to look directly at the uneclipsed or partially eclipsed sun is through special-purpose solar filters, such as "eclipse glasses" (example shown at left) or hand-held solar viewers. Homemade filters or ordinary sunglasses, even very dark ones, are not safe for looking at the sun; they transmit *thousands* of times too much sunlight. Refer to the American Astronomical Society (AAS) [Reputable Vendors of Solar Filters & Viewers\(link is external\)](#) page for a list of manufacturers and authorized dealers of eclipse glasses and handheld solar viewers verified to be compliant with the ISO 12312-2 international safety standard for such products.

- Always inspect your solar filter before use; if scratched or damaged, discard it. Read and follow any instructions printed on or packaged with the filter.
- Always supervise children using solar filters.
- Stand still and cover your eyes with your eclipse glasses or solar viewer before looking up at the bright sun. After looking at the sun, turn away and remove your filter do not remove it while looking at the sun.
- Do not look at the uneclipsed or partially eclipsed sun through an unfiltered camera, telescope, binoculars, or other optical device.
- Similarly, do not look at the sun through a camera, a telescope, binoculars, or any other optical device while using your eclipse glasses or hand-held solar viewer — the concentrated solar rays will damage the filter and enter your eye(s), causing serious injury.

- Seek expert advice from an astronomer before using a solar filter with a camera, a telescope, binoculars, or any other optical device. Note that solar filters must be attached to the *front* of any telescope, binoculars, camera lens, or other optics.



- If you are within the path of totality (<https://go.nasa.gov/2pC0lhe>), remove your solar filter only when the moon completely covers the sun's bright face and it suddenly gets quite dark. Experience totality, then, as soon as the bright sun begins to reappear, replace your solar viewer to look at the remaining partial phases.
- Outside the path of totality, you must *always* use a safe solar filter to view the sun directly.
- If you normally wear eyeglasses, keep them on. Put your eclipse glasses on over them, or hold your handheld viewer in front of them.

Note: If your eclipse glasses or viewers are compliant with the ISO 12312-2 safety standard, you may look at the uneclipsed or partially eclipsed Sun through them for as long as you wish. Furthermore, if the filters aren't scratched, punctured, or torn, you may reuse them indefinitely. Some glasses/viewers are printed with warnings stating that you shouldn't look through them for more than 3 minutes at a time and that you should discard them if they are more than 3 years old. *Such warnings are outdated and do not apply to eclipse viewers compliant with the ISO 12312-2 standard adopted in 2015.* To make sure you get (or got) your eclipse glasses/viewers from a supplier of ISO-compliant products, see the American Astronomical Society (AAS) [Reputable Vendors of Solar Filters & Viewers](#) page.

An alternative method for safe viewing of the partially eclipsed sun is [pinhole projection](#). For example, cross the outstretched, slightly open fingers of one hand over the outstretched, slightly open fingers of the other, creating a waffle pattern. With your back to the sun, look at your hands' shadow on the ground. The little spaces between your fingers will project a grid of small images on the ground, showing the sun as a crescent during the partial phases of the eclipse. Or just look at the shadow of a leafy tree during the partial eclipse; you'll see the ground dappled with crescent Suns projected by the tiny spaces between the leaves.

A solar eclipse is one of nature's grandest spectacles. By following these simple rules, you can safely enjoy the view and be rewarded with memories to last a lifetime. More information:

Additional Safety Information

An eclipse is a rare and striking phenomenon you won't want to miss, but you must carefully follow safety procedures. Don't let the requisite warnings scare you away from witnessing this singular spectacle! You can experience the eclipse safely, but it is vital that you protect your eyes at all times with the proper solar filters. No matter what recommended technique you use, do not stare continuously at the sun. Take breaks and give your eyes a rest! Do not use sunglasses: they don't offer your eyes sufficient protection. The only acceptable glasses are safe viewers designed for looking at the sun and solar eclipses. One excellent resource on how to determine if your viewers are safe can be found here: <https://eclipse.aas.org/eye-safety/iso-certification>

Viewing with Protection -- Experts suggests that one widely available filter for safe solar viewing is welders glass of sufficiently high number. The only ones that are safe for direct viewing of the Sun with your eyes are those of Shade 12 or higher. These are much darker than the filters used for most kinds of welding. If you have an old welder's helmet around the house and are thinking of using it to view the Sun, make sure you know the filter's shade number. If it's less than 12 (and it probably is), don't even *think* about using it to look at the Sun. Many people find the Sun too bright even in a Shade 12 filter, and some find the Sun too dim in a Shade 14 filter — but Shade 13 filters are uncommon and can be hard to find. The [AAS Reputable Vendors of Solar Filters & Viewers page](#) doesn't list any suppliers of welder's filters, only suppliers of special-purpose filters made for viewing the Sun. To find out more about eyewear and handheld viewers go to <https://eclipse.aas.org/eye-safety/eyewear-viewers>.

Telescopes with Solar Filters – Eclipses are best viewed directly when magnified, which means a telescope with a solar filter or solar telescopes. These will give you a magnified view that will clearly show the progress of an eclipse. Never look through a telescope without a solar filter on the large end of the scope. And never use small solar filters that attach to the eyepiece (as found in some older, cheaper telescopes.) Pinhole and Related Projection Methods(link is external) -- Pinhole projectors and other projection techniques are a safe, indirect viewing technique for observing an image of the sun. These provide a popular way for viewing solar eclipses. One viewing technique is to project an image of the sun onto a white surface with a projecting telescope. There are commercially available projection telescopes as well.

Besides eye protection during solar eclipse viewing, one needs to pay attention to their personal needs and surrounding. Below are some additional safety tips for eclipse observers before, during and after the August 21, 2017 solar eclipse.

IMPORTANT 2017-2018 Library News

Welcome back! I am your school librarian, Ms. Svarczkopf, writing to inform you of library happenings this school year! Please feel free to email, call, or stop in our library with any reading questions or concerns. I am here to encourage your children to learn by making reading exciting, rewarding, fulfilling, and **LASTING**.

For those new to St. Charles, students in **grades 2-8** participate in the **Accelerated Reader program as part of their reading grade**. Your students will visit the library each week to check out books to read for AR. The AR program is simple to follow. **(1.)** The student reads a book from the Accelerated Reader book list. **(2.)** The student then takes a computerized test on the book (at school only), answering multiple choice questions based on comprehension of the book's characters, plot, and summary. The students are NOT allowed to use the book to help them while taking a test. **(3.)** After finishing the test, the student receives a point score based on the number of questions answered correctly. For example, if the book was worth 5 points, and your child scored a 100% on the test, your child accumulated 5 points for the quarter by reading that book. **(4.)** Your child will continue this process until they have fulfilled OR surpassed their required point goal for that particular quarter. The computer keeps track of every student's points (quarterly & cumulatively), and the teachers then use the points for reading grades.

You can follow along with your student's AR progress at home through our AR HOME CONNECT program. Sometime this week, a very important letter entitled "Home Connect" came home to you. Follow the set of instructions in the letter to create your account and begin monitoring your student right away! A list of all AR books is available for you to view by going to the following web address: www.arbookfind.com. There are countless books with AR tests for your student to choose from. Type in the title or author and you will be able to see if a book your student may want to read is actually an AR book. You will also be able to see the reading level and point value of the book. If you are not sure of a book is a appropriate for your child to be reading, I recommend visiting www.commonsemmedia.org.

The students have 20-30 minutes of library time each week. During this time they check out books, take Accelerated Reading tests, and learn library skills. I have lots of fun book talks, challenges, and projects in store this year. Students are permitted to check out two books (one book for kindergarten) at a time. They are to return the books after one week, or if they need, to renew it weekly. So, if books are not returned, students may not check out new ones. Please help your child find a safe place to keep books at home. (Out of reach of pets, little brothers or sisters, weather, food, etc.) If a student loses or damages a book, he/she must pay a proportionate fine or pay the cost of replacing the book. Please encourage your child to take care of books and to return borrowed materials to the library promptly. I am looking forward to library time with your students each week!
