Reliability is doing something that we have agreed to do in a predictable way, without forgetting or having to be reminded. When we practice reliability, we really care about doing what we said we would do. Other people can relax knowing it is in our reliable hands.

Dear Parents and Students,

I hope you are well. I wanted to share a few thoughts on **DACA, the National Anthem, and the daily choices we make.**Wow. We have some passionate issues going on today that are causing division, anger, hurt, hate, hardship, violence, and even death. And whether we want to publicly state them or not, we all have our own personal opinions. I personally feel a little like a split personality on some days on the issues - passionate one way, agreeing with the other way, and then on to some Archie Bunker persona (younger parents may have to look up that reference). The less TV news and opinion I watch and read, the nicer I feel.

I reprinted, below, the letter from our Indiana Bishops in support of DACA (Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals) so that all may know the official stance of our local Catholic Church. Personally, I believe this is a three-part discussion. First, support DACA, or other forthcoming legislation, that will protect young people who have been living in our country all their lives. Keep families together. Second, secure our border with Mexico. The United States Government has a duty to create and support a system of secure borders. Third, reform our immigration policies to allow for immigrants to still have hope in, and access to, our great country.

Those are my opinions. My duties, however, may be something else. Our Bishops' duties, and ours, first and foremost, are to focus on the people now. When we strip away all the policies and the politics and the opinions, we are faced with the people before us: we have people among us who are classmates, neighbors, or even relatives, while others may simply be acquaintances, or even more remotely faces on the internet or on our televisions. As Christians we believe that all human beings are created in God's image. Not just the ones who look like us and believe what we believe. Further, we are reminded of our duty as Christians in the Gospel of Matthew 22:34-46. Jesus is being tested by the Sadducees and the Pharisees. He is answering questions about taxes, and arguments against the resurrection, and finally, after being whipped at every turn by Jesus, the Pharisees gather in a huddle and try to outsmart Jesus with one more question. Of course Jesus responds - BIG answer, boom, mic drop, begins to exit the stage, hesitates, turns, flips the script, and asks the gathered foes a question in turn.

34 "When the Pharisees heard that he (Jesus) had silenced the Sadducees, they gathered together and one of them [a scholar of the law] tested him by asking, "Teacher, which commandment in the law is the greatest?" He (Jesus) said to him (the scholar) "You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and first commandment. The second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself. The whole law and the prophets depend on these two commandments. While the Pharisees were gathered together, Jesus questioned them, saying "What is your opinion about the Messiah? Whose Son is he?" They (Pharisees) replied, "David's." He said to them, "How, then, does David, inspired by the Spirit, call him 'lord' saying: 'The Lord said to my lord, "Sit at my right hand until I place your enemies under your feet"? If David calls him 'lord' how can he be his son?" No one was able to answer him a word, nor from that day on did anyone dare to ask him (Jesus) any more questions.

Regarding our National Anthem . . . At the end of each day, we have a closing prayer before announcements. I rotate through a series of 5-7 prayers every few weeks. About once a week, I lead a prayer entitled *Prayer for Those in the Service*, which I adapted a few years ago to include law enforcement, firefighters, and all emergency personnel. We care about them. This is the prayer:

Almighty God, we stand before You asking for Your divine mercy and protection.

Embrace with Your invincible armour our loved ones in all branches of the service - Army, Navy, Air Force, & Marines - And all Law Enforcement Personnel, Firefighters, and Emergency Medical Personnel.

Give them courage and strength against all enemies both spiritual and physical,

And, for those who are away, hasten their safe journey back to their homes and families. Amen.

Most of us respect the right of citizens to peacefully protest. Many may not agree with using the National Anthem as a venue of protest, and would prefer that people stand respectfully during the playing of the Anthem, but overall, everyone will survive fellow citizens kneeling during our National Anthem. We seem to all be surviving anyway. The difficulty comes in clarifying the exact message or intent behind the kneeling.

Originally, the sitting, then kneeling was meant as a protest against unarmed black people being killed by the police. Last weekend, the kneeling and locking of arms were more of a response of unity directed towards President Trump who called for the firing any player who knelt during the National Anthem. Now, we have pee-wee league players kneeling, and even some of our own high school players wanting to kneel. Again, what is the true purpose? Who is driving the message? Have the real issues been lost and has kneeling become a little like a fad such as dabbing and the ice bucket challenge? Most groups supporting kneeling say that this is about racial inequality and systemic racism within government, law enforcement, and society in general.

Personally, that broad stroke of complaint and accusation is a lot to chew on, and even harder swallow. I am not sure how to proceed in trying to discuss problems that exist in a spirit of honesty and hope. This isn't a simple black and white issue, no pun intended. There is room for improvement all around. If we step back from the ugly secular rhetoric the media and political activist groups keep throwing at us trying to shape our minds and souls - and this happens on both sides of the fence - and if we look at what God wants us to do, we will find better paths to peacefully resolve disputes and grievances amongst one another.

We are being divided for a reason and we do not want to become pawns for either side. We need to dial down our opinions, cut our media participation, quit arguing, and focus more on God's word for answers. And we have the young people and the teenagers about whom to worry. We have to talk in truth and model in Christ, or else the division and conflict will only grow stronger as younger generations begin to mimic what we the adults say and do.

Finally, I will close with this. I apologize if this sounded too much like a lecture. That was not my intent. However, we are getting into dangerous territory, and we need to lead in our country, in our communities, on our teams, in our schools, and in our homes. If we focus on God's purpose for us as a human race, we will come through this. The fruits of the Spirit are "love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. Against such things there is no law." Where these are present, God is present. Where we find fear, despair, bitterness, anger, dishonesty, impatience, self-indulgence, violence and so on, God is not present. Moving forward let's work for God (rule #1) and let's work for one another (rule #2). Thank you for your children. Sincerely - Rob S.

INDIANA CATHOLIC BISHOPS' STATEMENT ON THE RESCISSION OF DACA EXECUTIVE ORDER

The Catholic Bishops of Indiana support all DACA (Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals) youth and call upon Congress to act responsibly to provide protection and legal status for these young persons who are contributing to the strength and prosperity of our nation. The decision to end DACA only brings uncertainty and anxiety to families who only want to provide for themselves, their families and contribute to the common good. We join the Bishops of the United States and call upon Congress to "immediately resume work toward a legislative solution". We also call upon all people of good will to urge Congress to provide a path of citizenship for these young persons. It is a matter not only of mercy, but of justice.

While not a permanent solution DACA did provide safety and a sense of protection to allow persons to live a normal life. These young people are members of the military, students, employees and leaders within our parishes and communities, using their God-given talents and gifts to contribute to the good residing in the United States.

In Indiana approximately 10,000 Hoosiers and their families will live in anxiety, not knowing what to expect following the President's order. We call upon President Trump not to turn our nation's back on these young people and to instead work with Congress on comprehensive immigration reform that is just and respects the God-given dignity of these vulnerable youths and all immigrants especially those residing in the United States.

We stand in solidarity with DACA youth and their families who have been left unprotected from deportation and fear for their futures in the United States, their home. We say to DACA youth - regardless of your immigration status, you are children of God and welcome in the Catholic Church. The Catholic Church supports you and will advocate for you.

Although our initial motivation for doing this training came from the Bishop's' mandate in the **Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People**, we now know that this is important personal safety information all children should have. A specific script has been developed for us to implement. I will be talking to each K-6 classroom in October and November this year. I will also be presenting the Diocesan required Boundaries Program to 7th and 8th graders in October and November during their Religion classes. A copy of the PowerPoint used in grades 1-5 is attached to this newsletter for your review. If you are interested in receiving a specific copy of the information presented to Kindergarten or of the PowerPoints for 6th, 7th, or 8th grades before the presentations, they can be found in the office. **According to diocesan policy, if you do not want your child to participate, a Parent Refusal form must be signed prior to the presentations. These are available in the office. A copy of the PowerPoint will be sent home with your student. You are welcome to come sit in the back of the classroom during presentations. 
