SUICIDE - THE NETFLIX SERIES "13 REASONS WHY" - SHOULD OUR CHILDREN BE WATCHING!?

The Netflix series called "13 Reasons Why" has recently come to our attention. This TV show is about a high school student who committed suicide and leaves behind thirteen cassette tape recordings to peers she claims contributed to her taking her own life. Many middle school age and high school age students are binge watching this show. It is not recommended for youth as it is rated MA.

As Catholic educators, we are concerned about the anti-life message, violence and other graphic images that are portrayed in this series. In addition, we are very concerned about the misinformation this series sends to youth about the causes and prevention of suicide. Several accredited resources share other concerns, including the glorifying of suicide, the inaccurate depiction of mental health and counseling, and the portrayal of suicide as a heroic act and the only answer to problems.

The National Association of School Psychologists has provided information that is recommended for parents to use in discussion with their children if they have seen "13 Reasons Why". These recommendations include:

- Ask your child if he or she has heard of or seen "13 Reasons Why". We don't advise that they be encouraged to view the show, but if they have seen it, tell them that you want to watch it with them, or catch up, and discuss their thoughts.
- If they exhibit any warning signs, don't be afraid to ask them if they have thought about suicide or if someone is hurting them. Raising the issue of suicide does not increase the risk or give them the idea, it creates the opportunity to help.
- Ask your child if they think any of their classmates or friends show warning signs. Talk with them about how to seek help for them. Guide them on how to respond and keep communication open.
- Listen to your child's comments without judgment. Pay attention, remember what is being said, and put your own agenda aside.
- Get help from a school-employed or community-based mental health professional if you are worried about your child's safety or that of one of their peers.

The topic of suicide is a sensitive issue and we need to make ourselves aware and learn how to help our youth. Above all, please know that we pray daily for your children, their safety and well being, and their journey to living the life God intends for them. The National Suicide Prevention lifeline provides free, confidential support to people in suicidal crisis or emotional distress at 1-800-273-TALK (8255).

SUPREME COURT HEARS BLAINE AMENDMENT CASE (CAPE outlook, May 2017)

The State of Missouri excluded a preschool program operated by Trinity Lutheran Church of Columbia from a scrap tire recycling program that would have made its playground surface safer. It did so solely because "the preschool is operated by a church rather than a secular not-for-profit." The state thus violated the Free Exercise Clause of the First Amendment of the U.S. Constitution by "imposing special disabilities on the basis of religious views" and "forcing a choice" between the exercise of religion and receipt of a government benefit.

That's as far as David Cortman got in his opening statement to the Supreme Court of the United States in Trinity Lutheran Church of Columbia, Inc. v. Comer before Justice Anthony Kennedy interrupted with the first of an extended series of probing questions by the justices—questions designed to determine exactly where the facts fit within the space between the constitution's prohibition against the government establishing a religion and its protection of the free exercise thereof.

Far-Reaching Implications.

The outcome of the case could have far-reaching implications for programs of state aid to students in religious schools. It hinges on the state's Blaine Amendment, which provides that "no money shall ever be taken from the public treasury, directly or indirectly, in aid of any church, sect, or denomination of religion...." During oral arguments, Justice Sonia Sotomayor noted there are "39 states with constitutional amendments like the one Missouri has," so a broad ruling by the court could send shock waves across the nation.

Cortman, senior counsel with the Alliance Defending Freedom and the representative of Trinity Lutheran in the case, responded skillfully to the court's multiple inquiries. Justice Kennedy asked him whether states could ever use religious status to deny state benefits to an individual or organization. "Why would someone's religious status matter in the first place to receiving a government benefit?" Cortman wondered.

In response to a point by Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg that the constitution prohibits the use of tax money to pay for churches, Cortman drew the distinction in case law between the funding of explicitly religious activities and the funding of secular activities by a religious organization.

All but two justices (Ginsburg and Sotomayor) seemed at least somewhat sympathetic to the church's claim of discrimination. Justice Elena Kagan, for example, conceded that the church was on "strongest ground" with its charge that the state had decided to fund some activity but had denied the same funding "to a particular party based solely on that party's religious status." At the same time, however, she made clear a state could prohibit the use of funds for religious activity and could even take some measures to make sure the funds were not diverted toward such activity.

Police Protection

In an exercise of jurisprudential common sense, Justice Stephen Breyer identified a series of services provided to religious institutions that state Blaine amendments don't seem to prevent: police and fire protection, crossing guards, health services. He asked James Layton, who represented the state, "[D]oes the Constitution of the United States permit a state or a city to say, we give everybody in this city police protection, but not churches? We give everybody fire protection, but let the church burn down. We give everybody public health protection, but not a church." He continued, "If it does not permit a law that pays money out of the treasury for the health of the children in the church... how does it permit Missouri to deny money to the same place for helping children not fall in the playground, cut their knees, get tetanus, break a leg, et cetera? What's the difference?"

Pursuing a similar line of questioning, Justice Samuel Alito asked whether the Missouri constitution would allow the use of state funds to protect religious schools against a heightened risk of a terrorist attacks, or to repair church buildings that are destroyed by bombings, or to enhance security at religious schools—forms of aid previously approved by Congress or other jurisdictions.

SUPREME COURT HEARS BLAINE AMENDMENT CASE (continued)

In the same vein, Chief Justice Roberts asked whether the state could deny tours of the state capitol to students from religious schools while providing the service to other students. One issue addressed by several justices was whether the case was moot in light of a decision days before by Missouri Governor Eric Greitens to reverse the state's policy and allow religious organizations to receive the scrap tire grants.

Both attorneys argued that the case should move forward. Layton explained that a taxpayer lawsuit against the new policy could keep the constitutional question alive, as could a reversal of the policy by the state's next governor. A decision is expected by late June.

"Create in Me a Clean Heart" (Ps. 51) I prayed for a new heart, and the Lord saw fit to give one to me. I wish to thank everyone for the prayers and cards both before and after my heart transplant surgery. Your support, and that of Fr. Tom and the parish staff, lifted me beyond any despair. The hospital transplant staff considers themselves an "army" behind the transplant patient. With the knowledge that a similar "army" of prayers and Masses from this parish was behind me, how could I doubt the outcome? Thank you to the volunteers who helped my family prepare my home as a safe environment for when I released from the hospital, as well as to those who continue to step in when assistance is needed. Because the medicines after a transplant severely suppress the immune system, it will be some months before I can return to playing for Masses, and I greatly miss the Choir, Guitar Group and 5pm Sunday Group, and serving all of you. I will return as soon as the doctors allow and my strength returns.

Coming home on Good Friday, the day Christ suffered and died for us, profoundly reminded me that someone died that I might live and return to my children and family whom I love dearly, and the people of this parish for whom I care so deeply. Please pray for the family who lost a loved one and so generously gave that another might live. And to the anonymous visitor, who came shortly after my surgery and I apparently ordered out of the room, please understand that is was the drugs! Karen Hope

NEWS NOTES FROM YOUR SCHOOL NURSE

Attention parents: Please mark your calendars and notice the included flyer from Indiana MOM (Mission of Mercy). **A FREE Dental event will be held Friday and Saturday, May 12th and 13th, at the Indiana State Fairgrounds in Indianapolis.** The goal of this event is to provide charitable dental services to underserved Hoosiers, both adults and children including: -Comprehensive oral exams, X-Rays, Cleanings, Extractions, Fillings, Limited crowns, limited root canals, limited partial dentures. Get that needed dental work completed for you and the children.

All services are free, no insurance is necessary, and no questions will be asked of patients. Go early. For more information: <https://IndianaMOM.org>.

VISION REFERRALS: The State of Indiana requires that we do a yearly vision and hearing screening on appropriate grade levels. This was done in early October. Failure and borderline failure referral letters were sent out promptly. Where are your vision referral forms? Contact me in the office if you may have misplaced your child's vision referral form or write a note that an eye exam was completed and the results of it. Many forms are outstanding. Our state report is due very soon.

IMMUNIZATIONS: Kindly send in your child's immunization dates. Do not wait until the last minute and cause yourself stress. Make kindergarten physical appointments now, and have immunizations completed in the doctor's office, at a clinic, or SuperShots.

Remember to bring your child's vaccination record to that appointment. Then, have this information sent to school now. It is due, by Indiana state law, on the first day of school.

Those needing immunizations were noted in detail in a previous newsletter.

Here is a quick recap:

Current 5th graders need: Tdap and Meningitis vaccines. Hepatitis A is recommended.

Next year's K-3 need 2 Hepatitis A, 2 MMR, 5 Dtap, 4 Polio, 2 Varicella, 3 Hep B.

All other grades: Hepatitis A is recommended at this time but it will eventually be a requirement.

Medications: All medications not picked up by the last day of school will be destroyed. Please pick up your meds last week of school. (Epi-Pens may not be picked-up until the last day of school for obvious reasons.) We **cannot** store ANY Medications or Epi-Pens over the summer break. Please remember to pick up your meds.

BDHS Placement Tests

Math and English placement exams are scheduled for Saturday, April 29, and **Saturday, May 6**, at Bishop Dwenger High School for our current 8th graders, BDHS Class of 2021.
