**The City of Fort Wayne is proposing opening an Addiction Treatment Facility only a mile away from St. Charles.** As the Principal of our school, I am not in favor of the location, but I am in favor of any reasonable steps to help those battling addiction,

especially with the current opioid crisis we are facing in our community, and across our country. The proposed site of the facility is the former GTE -Verizon building next to Hall's Triangle Park restaurant at the west end of Trier Rd. The proposal has already begun the first phases of being passed into reality. According to WANE TV "The land needs to be rezoned to C1 which would allow a drug treatment facility. The Plan Commission will consider that later this month. **Wednesday night (August 17th) the Board of Zoning Appeals approved a special exception to allow the space to not only be used for drug treatment, but court ordered drug treatment.**" The Fort Wayne City Council is holding a special meeting discussing the opioid epidemic on August 29th. I have cobbled together some articles from the WANE TV website and one from the News-Sentinel chronicling the issue for your information. At this time, I am unsure if the August 29th meeting will be a forum for site discussion, or just the opioid epidemic in general. We will continue to monitor the situation and share proposed next steps. Again, I support a new treatment facility, but I would rather see the location move away from schools and heavily populated neighborhoods.

### **Addiction treatment center proposed to fight opioid epidemic**

FORT WAYNE, Ind. (WANE) – Park Center would like to rezone a plot of land near Coliseum Boulevard to make way for a new 100-bed addiction treatment facility. The vacant building sits at 2827 Rupp Drive and was once the home of a Verizon office.



Park Center would like to build a new addiction treatment center at 2827 Rupp Drive, just off Coliseum Boulevard. The idea evolved from the Governor's Task Force on Drug Enforcement, Treatment and Prevention, created by former Governor Mike Pence. The group was asked to assess the state's drug crisis and come up with ways to treat and prevent addiction. Allen Superior Court judge Wendy Davis is on the task force. Most of the patients would be referred by an Allen County court judge and would be under supervision of the courts during their stay. Allen County is on track to have a record number of deaths from opioid overdoses. According to Paul Wilson, Park Center's chief executive officer, roughly 1,000 people will overdose on opioids this year, 100 of them will die.

Some people who live nearby they understand the need for the treatment center but spoke out against the proposal citing concerns about the location.

"It's not about the efforts here to help people," said Mike Conley. "I want people to be helped but it has to be located in the right place."

Mike Conley, who lives about two miles from the building said the location is too close to children. The facility would be located near several elementary schools and high schools, along with Ivy Tech and IPFW. "They are smack dab in the middle of arguably the highest concentration of children in the city as far as schools go," he said.

Wilson said there would be at least two security officers on site around the clock. Residents would stay at the facility an average of 30 days. "These people are in our community all the time," said Wilson. "These people are in the community but they are just not getting help. We don't anticipate that this is going to have any adverse affects on [safety], and we'll do everything we can to work with neighbors as this proceeds."

The Plan Commission will hold a public hearing regarding the proposed treatment center on Thursday August 17 at 6 p.m.

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### **Despite opposition, zoning board approves drug treatment facility**

FORT WAYNE, Ind. (WANE) – The Park Center treatment facility planned for the northeast side of Fort Wayne is not a done deal, but it's one step closer to getting rezoned so it can happen. Neighbors opposed to this plan will follow it along the way.

The land needs to be rezoned to C1 which would allow a drug treatment facility. The Plan Commission will consider that later this month. **Wednesday night the Board of Zoning Appeals approved a special exception to allow the space to not only be used for drug treatment, but court ordered drug treatment.**

Dozens of people showed up to speak against the plan to put the court ordered drug treatment facility in the long-time vacant Verizon building on Rupp Drive east of Coliseum Boulevard. Their main concern is safety. However, police and Park Center officials said the community will be more safe with more drug addicts receiving help.

Park Center officials told the Board of Zoning Appeals Wednesday night the plan is to have the treatment facility as an alternative to jail. Police also spoke at the meeting and said judges are inundated with cases because of the opiate epidemic, and they need other options rather than jail to get some people on the right path. The facility would not be a lock up which made neighbors question if patients coming and going would put safety in jeopardy.

The plan is to have two security guards there around the clock, and possibly a police outpost nearby. For neighbors who support the plan that is good enough.

"As I listened to the representatives from Park Center tonight I was reassured personally that they have the security concerns addressed," William Jewell, a neighbor who supports the plan, said.

"This facility that we uncovered tonight will house felons, drug addicted felons, and that's the questions of safety that has to be answered," James Cox, a neighbor who opposes the plan said.

Only two members of the public spoke in favor of the plan.

Even if the Plan Commission approves to recommend the rezone it will still have to go to City Council for final approval.

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## **CITY COUNCIL TO HOST OPIOID-ABUSE FORUM AUGUST 29th**

President Donald Trump has declared opioid abuse a national health emergency, and now City Council will explore what can be done to combat the problem in Fort Wayne.

Although council does not normally meet on the fifth Tuesday of the month, it will conduct one of its periodic "Fifth Tuesday" sessions from 5:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. Aug. 29 to address what organizer Geoff Paddock, D-5th, called "a terrible drug epidemic going on in Fort Wayne and Allen County. It has affected almost every neighborhood . . . I want to invite police officers and other officials who are working on solving this problem, and give an update to the citizens of Fort Wayne."

The meeting is open to the public and will be held in Room 30 of Citizens Square, 200 E. Berry St.

This will be the first formal discussion council has conducted on this issue. Paddock said in a statement he wants to examine more closely how citizens can work with law enforcement, criminal justice officials, and treatment centers, to address drug addiction.

"This is a nationwide problem, but on the local level I have heard from a number of constituents who have been personally affected by the crimes associated with drug abuse. This is in their neighborhoods, and they want a clearer idea of how our local officials are working together to combat the problem," Paddock said.

Speakers will include Police Chief Steve Reed, Police Narcotics Capt. Kevin Hunter, Allen County Health Commissioner Dr. Deborah McMahan, Otis R. Bowen Treatment Center Director Megan Fisher and others. Public comment will also be accepted.

### SCRIP NEWS

**Congratulations** – The winner of the *Kindergarten/1<sup>st</sup> Grade Back-to-School* promotion was *Sarah Bauer!* We were happy to welcome a few new names to the SCRIP family with these orders. Out of the 144 SCRIP packets that were handed out to kindergarten and first grade families, 27 were returned.

**Back-to-School Promotion** – Thanks to Ron Buskirk for sharing how and why his family is deeply committed to using SCRIP. Ron shared that last year we sold a little over \$2.8 million in gift cards that netted a profit for the parish of about \$80,000 and \$80,000 that went back to our SCRIP customers. The average profit is 5% which gets split 50/50 with the parish and the purchaser.

We had a great response in orders following Ron's pep talk, documenting 111 orders processed 8/15 – 8/18. This was a great improvement over what we had been seeing all summer. Today was the last day to place an order to qualify for the *Back-to-School* promotion. The winner will be announced in next week's newsletter.
